TRANSITIONAL EXECUTIVE COUNCIL : AFFIRMATION OF SECRECY

In terms of Section 22(15)(c) of the Transitional Executive Council Act, every member of the Council, the subcouncils and the Committee, and of any other structure, organ or body established by or under this Act, and every member of the staff of the Council, the subcouncils, the Committee and any such structure, organ or body, shall, before assuming office or duty, make and subscribe to the following affirmation of secrecy:

I, ..... solemnly declare:

- (a) I have take cognizance of the provisions of section 22(15) of the Transitional Executive Council Act, 1993.
- (b) I understand that I may not disclose any information or document, or the content thereof, of whatever nature that comes to my knowledge or into my possession in consequence of my performance of any function in terms of the Transitional Executive Council Act, 1993, whether verbal or in writing, to any unauthorized person without prior written approval of the Transitional Executive Council.
- (c) I am fully aware of the serious consequences which may follow any breach or contravention of the above-mentioned provisions.

### **STANDING RULES OF PROCEDURE OF THE TRANSITIONAL EXECUTIVE COUNCIL ESTABLISHED IN TERMS OF SECTION 2 OF THE TRANSITIONAL EXECUTIVE COUNCIL ACT, 1993 (ACT 151 OF 1993)**

#### **1. Application**

These Rules of Procedure shall apply at meetings of the Transitional Executive Council (TEC).

#### **2. Participants**

The participating parties entitled to be represented at meetings of the TEC are those nominated in terms of section 4(3) of the Act and appointed by the State President in terms of section 4(4) of the Act, or their alternates nominated and appointed as such in terms of the said section.

#### **3. Decisions**

All decisions of the TEC shall be taken in accordance with section 25 of the Act.

#### **4. Quorum**

The Chairperson may declare a meeting open and permit the debate to proceed when at least 75% of the parties represented on the TEC are present.

#### **5. Speeches and interventions**

5.1 Every member of the TEC shall be entitled to speak.

5.2 If a speaking order has been agreed upon, the Chairperson shall call the speakers in that order.

5.3 In general, the Chairperson shall call on speakers in the order in which they signify their desire to speak. The Chairperson, however,



shall ensure that each member is afforded a reasonable opportunity to speak.

- 5.4 The Chairperson shall apply the standard rules applicable to meetings, except as otherwise stipulated herein.

## **6. Minutes and Documentation**

- 6.1 The proceedings of meetings of the TEC shall be recorded in full, but only agreements and decisions shall be minuted and made available to all members of the TEC.
- 6.2 Where a member or members specifically request that their objection is noted, their objection will be so minuted.

## **7. Media**

In general, all meetings of the TEC shall be open to the media, with the proviso that the TEC may, for good reason, decide that the whole or a part of a meeting should be closed to the media.

## **8. Amendment of the Rules of Procedure**

These Rules of Procedure can be amended by the TEC.



**ACTION REQUIRED BY THE TRANSITIONAL EXECUTIVE COUNCIL AT  
ITS FIRST MEETING OR SOON THEREAFTER REGARDING THE  
TRANSITIONAL EXECUTIVE COUNCIL ACT, 1993, THE INDEPENDENT  
ELECTORAL COMMISSION ACT, THE INDEPENDENT MEDIA  
COMMISSION ACT, 1993, AND THE INDEPENDENT BROADCASTING  
AUTHORITY ACT, 1993**

**SECTION I:**

**A. THE TRANSITIONAL EXECUTIVE COUNCIL ACT, 1993**

1. In terms of section 24(3) of the Transitional Executive Council Act, 1993 (the Act), a person designated by the Negotiating Council shall preside at the first meeting of the Transitional Executive Council (TEC), at which occasion the TEC shall designate from among its members a chairperson or chairpersons.
- 2.1 In terms of section 24(4) of the the Act, the TEC shall at its first meeting, from among its members, appoint a management committee.
- 2.2 Recommendation: It is recommended that the TEC appoints a management committee at its meeting on 7 December 1993.
- 3.1 In terms of section 26(1) of the Act the TEC shall at its first meeting, or as soon as possible thereafter, appoint a person to the office of Executive Director.
- 3.2 Recommendation: It is recommended that the TEC appoints the Executive Director as well as a Deputy Executive Director at its meeting on 7 December 1993.
- 4.1 In terms of section 7(1)(d) of the Act the TEC shall appoint staff to assist the TEC and the subcouncils in the performance of their functions, and in consultation with the State President determine the conditions of service, remuneration, allowances and other benefits of such staff. The TEC may also in terms of section 7(1)(e) of the Act request the secondment of staff from any public service in South Africa to assist the TEC or a subcouncil in the performance of its functions.



**4.2 Recommendation:** It is recommended that the TEC mandates -

- (i) the Executive Director referred to in section 26(1), to appoint personnel in consultation with the Deputy Executive Director, which appointments could then be ratified at the next meeting of the Management Committee;
- (ii) the Executive Director and the Deputy Executive Director to determine the conditions of service, remuneration, allowances and other benefits of such staff in consultation with the State President on behalf of the TEC, which conditions could then be ratified at the next meeting of the Management Committee.

**5.1** The TEC shall also open and administer its own financial accounts (section 7(1)(i) of the Act).

**5.2 Recommendation:** It is recommended that the TEC mandates the Executive Director to open the account referred to in section 7(1)(i).

**6.1** In terms of section 11(1) of the Act the conditions of service, remuneration, allowances and other benefits of members of the subcouncils shall be determined by the State President in consultation with the TEC.

**6.2 Recommendation:** It is recommended that the TEC mandates the Executive Director and the Deputy Executive Director to submit a recommendation regarding the conditions of service, remuneration, allowances and other benefits of members of the subcouncils to the TEC.

**7.1** Every member of the TEC, the subcouncils and the Access to Information Committee referred to in section 22(4) of the Act, and of any other structure, organ or body established by or under the Act, and every member of the staff of such institutions shall, before assuming office or duty, make and subscribe to an affirmation of secrecy (section 22(15)(c) of the Act).



## **SECTION II:**

### **A. THE TRANSITIONAL EXECUTIVE COUNCIL ACT, 1993**

1. In terms of section 24(4) of the the Act, the TEC management committee shall, *inter alia*, determine the manner of convening meetings of the TEC and the procedure at such meetings (pending the rules contemplated in section 7(1)(f) of the Act).
- 2.1 In terms of section 9 of the Act the TEC shall appoint the members of the subcouncils referred to in section 8.
- 2.2 **Recommendation:** Timeous appointment of these members would be essential in order to enable the TEC to function effectively.
- 3.1 In terms of section 22(4)(a) of the Act the TEC shall establish a committee, to be known as the Access to Information Committee and the remuneration, allowances and other benefits of the members of this Committee who are not in the full-time service of any government or administration, may be determined by the TEC.
- 3.2 **Recommendation:** It is recommended that the TEC establishes the Access to Information Committee as soon as possible and that it mandates the Executive Director and the Deputy Executive Director to submit a recommendation regarding the remuneration, allowances and other benefits of the members of the Committee to the TEC at its next meeting.

### **B. INDEPENDENT ELECTORAL COMMISSION ACT, 1993**

The following matters require immediate or near-immediate attention to implement the above Act:

1. Section 42 of the Independent Electoral Commission Act, 1993 (the Act), provides that the Act comes into operation on a date fixed by the State President, on the advice of the Transitional Executive Council (TEC), by proclamation in the *Gazette*.
2. In terms of Section 5(1) of the Act the Independent Electoral Commission



(IEC) consists of not fewer than 7 and not more than 11 members, who shall be appointed by the State President upon the advice of the TEC. A further 5 persons from the international community shall also be appointed by the State President upon the advice of the TEC (section 5(2)(a) of the Act).

3. Section 5(3) of the Act provides that the TEC advises the State President on the designation of 2 members as Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson of the IEC. The TEC may, however, advise the State President to designate two members as Co-Chairpersons and to designate which one shall preside at the first meeting of the IEC.
4. In terms of section 10 of the Act the conditions of service, remuneration, allowances and other benefits of members of the IEC and the International Advisory Committee (see paragraph 5) will be determined by the TEC after consultation with the State President.
5. Upon the advice of the TEC the State President shall establish an International Advisory Committee to advise the IEC on any matter regarding the performance of its functions (section 14(1)). In terms of section 14(2) this Committee may consist of persons from the international community appointed in a non-representative capacity by the State President upon the advice of the TEC.
6. Sections 19, 22 and 25 of the Act provide for the establishment, on the date on which the IEC is constituted, of the Election Administration Directorate (section 19), the Election Monitoring Directorate (section 22) and the Election Adjudication Secretariat (section 25). The IEC shall invite and, where given, consider, but shall not be bound by, the advice of the TEC on the appointment of the Chief Director: Administration and any deputy director (section 20(2)), the Chief Director: Monitoring (section 23(2)) and the Secretary of the Election Adjudication Secretariat (section 26(2)).
7. In terms of section 37 of the Act the TEC may, after consultation with the Minister of State Expenditure, determine the remuneration and allowances payable to members of the Special Electoral Court (subsection (1)).



**C. INDEPENDENT MEDIA COMMISSION ACT, 1993**

1. In terms of section 36 of the Independent Media Commission Act, 1993 (the Act), the Act shall come into operation on a date to be determined by the Transitional Executive Council (TEC), which date shall be made known by the State President by proclamation in the *Gazette*. The following matters would require immediate attention by the TEC so as to facilitate the commencement of the Act:
  - 1.1 In terms of section 4 of the Act the Independent Media Commission (IMC) shall consist of seven commissioners appointed by the State President on the advice of the TEC. These appointments are to be made simultaneously, announced in the *Gazette*, and shall be effective as from the date of such announcement.
  - 1.2 The chairperson of the IMC shall be either a judge, practising advocate or attorney or a magistrate (section 5(1)), and at least two commissioners shall have experience in the field of the broadcasting media and at least one in the field of the printing media (section 5(2)). The commissioners shall also be persons who -
    - \* in the opinion of the TEC are of a high standing and merit and are suitable to serve on the IMC by virtue of their qualifications, expertise and experience;
    - \* are committed to fairness, freedom of expression, the right of the public to be informed and openness and accountability of persons holding public office;
    - \* represent a broad cross-section of the population of the Republic; and
    - \* are committed to the objects and principles of the Act (section 5(3)).
  - 1.3 Section 6 of the Act sets out several categories of persons disqualified from being commissioners.
  - 1.4 In terms of section 10 of the Act, commissioners shall be paid such remuneration and allowances as the TEC, in consultation with the Minister of State Expenditure, may determine.



2. Upon the commencement of the Act, the following matters would require immediate or near-immediate attention:

- 2.1 Section 25 of the Act provides that the expenditure in connection with the application and administration of the Act shall be paid from public funds allocated by the TEC in consultation with the Minister of State Expenditure. The chief administrative officer may from time to time in writing requisition moneys for these purposes.
- 2.2 In terms of section 31 of the Act, the provisions of the Act will apply *mutatis mutandis* in any state or territory which was previously part of the Republic, if the TEC and the government of such state or territory so agree and a law of such state or territory so provides.



**D. INDEPENDENT BROADCASTING AUTHORITY ACT, 1993**

1. In terms of section 83 of the Independent Broadcasting Authority Act, 1993 (the Act), the Act shall come into operation on a date to be determined by the Transitional Executive Council (TEC), which date shall be made known by the State President by proclamation in the *Gazette*. In terms of section 83(1)(b) of the Act sections 49(6) and 50(3) shall come into operation on 1 January 1996. Different dates may be determined in respect of different provisions of the Act. The following matters would require attention by the TEC so as to facilitate the implementation of the Act:
  - 1.1 Section 3 of the Act provides for the establishment of the Independent Broadcasting Authority (IBA), and in terms of section 3(2) of the Act the IBA shall be governed and represented by a Council and all acts of such council shall in law be regarded as the acts of the IBA.
  - 1.2 Section 4 of the Act provides that the membership of the Council shall consist of a chairperson and six other councillors, appointed by the State President on the advice of the TEC or, where the TEC has dissolved, by the National Assembly in accordance with the Constitution Act.
  - 1.3 Section 5 of the Act disqualified certain persons from being or remaining councillors.



## IMF-COMPENSATORY AND CONTINGENCY FINANCING FACILITY (CCFF)

The Compensatory and Contingency Financing Facility is a facility of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) consisting of a compensatory component under which a country is compensated for a shortfall in export earnings or for additional expenditures incurred on cereal imports, and a contingency component which is disbursed to countries that already have programmes in place that qualify for lending.

Under the guidelines on compensatory financing South Africa qualifies for 30 percent of its quota of SDR's in respect of the export shortfall and 15 percent of its quota of SDR's for cereal imports. This amounts to 45 percent of South Africa's quota at the IMF or US \$ 850 million. The aforementioned calculation is based on data for the 12 month period ending 30 June 1993.

Repayment of the facility is in eight equal instalments commencing  $3\frac{1}{4}$  years after disbursement and the interest rate is based on the SDR rate which is currently around 4,13 percent.

Dear Mr Camdessus

As you know, the Government and the principal nongovernmental groups that make up the Transitional Executive Council (TEC) have been engaged in discussions with the staff of the IMF on economic policies aimed at alleviating South Africa's balance of payments difficulties. The recent strains in the balance of payments are attributable chiefly to lower prices for commodity exports and a drought that necessitated large imports of maize. The Government intends soon to request a purchase under the Compensatory and Contingency Financing Facility (CCFF) with respect to the shortfall in export earnings and the excess in cereal import costs during the year ended June 1993.

The attached Statement of Policies outlines the economic program during the period ahead. We believe that the successful conclusion of the present Article IV consultation together with the understandings reflected in the attached Statement of Policies demonstrate South Africa's willingness to cooperate with the Fund to find appropriate solutions to the country's balance of payments difficulties and fulfil the test of cooperation set forth in paragraphs 12 and 31 of the Executive Board Decision on the CCFF.
